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
1st Annual Elder Youth Wellness Conference....

On April 22, John Henry started to make the Sugar Bush camp at his house on Perch Lake. It wasn't until the 11th and 12th graders got there that things started to work. The students split into groups of three or four and took on different jobs. One group had to make spickets. They did this by going out into the woods to gather the sumac. After we cut the the spickets, the bark was peeled off and the soft center was burned out with a hot rod. This process was done over and over intil we had enough were: Melissa Urrutia, Pat spickets to tap the Maples in the surrounding area.

> Other groups were resoponsible for tapping the trees. They took drills, spickets, nails, and buckets. When they found a Maple, the taps had to be drilled 3 feet above the ground and always on the South side of the tree because that is the warmest side and this allows the sap to run more

OJS STUDENTS ON B.W.C.A CANOE TRIP!!



Chris would like to attend a community college and get married!!




